Nutritional context in Cambodia




Nutrition situation

- Between 2000 and 2021-22, the maternal mortality rate dropped from 437 to 154 (per 100,000 live births) and the under-five mortality rate dropped from 124 to 16 (per 1000 live births).
- Stunting has modestly declined from 50% in 2000 to 22% in 2021-22, as did underweight, from 28% in 2005 and 2014 to 16% in 2021-22.
- Wasting increased between 2005 and 2014, from 8% to 10%, and remained the same in 2021-22.
- The double burden of overweight/obesity is an emerging problem, with the rate of overweight among children under 5 doubling since 2014, to 4% in 2021-22.
- Cambodia's maternal mortality rate is more than double the average for the Asia Pacific region (69 per 100,000 live births).
- The prevalence of anaemia in children aged 6-59 months declined from 63.4% (2000) to 49% (2019), however this was only a 1% decrease from the 4 years prior.
- The prevalence of anaemia in pregnant women declined from 66.4% in 2000 to 52.7% in 2010 and 47% in 2019.
- Exclusive breastfeeding in the first 6 months has declined from 65% in 2014 to 52% in 2021-22. Similarly, early initiation of breastfeeding declined from 64.6% to 54% in the same time period.
- Malnutrition causes approximately 4,500 child deaths annually, which accounts for roughly one third of all child deaths in Cambodia.
- 58% of children aged 6 to 24 months, and about 65% of children aged 6 to 8 months, do not consume the daily minimum acceptable diet. Disparities exist here as well: children from the poorest families are half as likely to receive a minimum acceptable diet than children from the wealthiest families, and children living in rural areas are 20% less likely to do so than those living in urban areas.

Political commitment

- In June 2014, the Kingdom of Cambodia joined the SUN Movement with a letter of commitment from H.E. Prime Minister Hun Sen.
- Four SUN Networks have since been established: SUN Business Network, SUN Civil Society Alliance, SUN UN Network, and SUN Donor Network.
- The Royal Government of Cambodia established the Technical Working Group for Food Security and Nutrition (TWG-FSN), led by the Council for Agricultural and Rural Development, as the national platform for nutrition.
- Since 2019, sub-national Provincial Working Groups for Coordination Food Security and Nutrition (PWG-FSN) have been established in every province of the country.
- The Second National Strategy for Food Security and Nutrition (NSFSN) 2019-2023 is currently the key guiding document for nutrition action in the country.



Mapping Specific Definitions

Responsible Ministry

Ministry, department or institution of the Government participating in the monitoring and evaluation of the action

Action

These are the nutrition activities or interventions that were chosen to be mapped identified in consultation with multi-sectoral stakeholders engaged in nutrition

Implementer

This role refers to all partners delivering nutrition actions directly to the beneficiaries

Delivery mechanism

A list of country-specific mechanisms that define how an action has been implemented

Catalyst

Partners who provide coordination, M&E, and/or technical assistance to the nutrition actions being mapped.

Geographic coverage

Percentage of geographical areas in which an action has been carried out (where at least one stakeholder has reached a beneficiary)

Donor

This role refers to partners who provide funding for the identified nutrition actions

Population coverage

Percentage of target group that benefited from an action, compared to the total size of that target group

- A stakeholder may assume several roles for a single action (e.g. the responsible ministry may also be the field implementer through its public servants)
- Some roles may not be filled for each action
- The donor role includes donors and technical partners who have funded implementing organizations

 'Delivery mechanisms' can be strategies (e.g. campaigns or routines), human capital (e.g. extension workers, religious leaders), approaches (e.g. community-led, health centres), etc. The set of options is countryspecific and decided by the government and partners engaged in nutrition

In order to determine coverage, total population of key target groups was gathered




The population of most of the key target groups for the mapping year (2022) was based on the 2019 Population Census (e.g. Children 0-59 months, women of reproductive age)

For a few of the key target groups alternative sources or additional calculations had to be made:

- Primary-school aged children (alternative source)
- List of villages in each province (alternative source)
- Number of pregnant women (calculated)

Disclaimer for the Nutrition Stakeholder & Action Mapping

- The Cambodia Nutrition Stakeholder & Action Mapping intends to help improve nutrition coordination and scale-up discussions by providing an indicative overview of who the stakeholders in nutrition are, where they are working, and estimated coverage of beneficiaries for selected Core Nutrition Actions.
- Both the geographical and beneficiary coverage are estimated based on the information provided and obtained at the provincial level. The coverage is therefore
 not to be considered as exhaustive or exact. Moreover, it is voluntary to report, and not necessarily all stakeholders have been identified or have chosen to
 contribute.
- The mapping has only collected data on selected Core Nutrition Actions which were developed from the Compendium of Actions for Nutrition (2016) and adapted to Cambodia's context. Nutrition Actions were selected in consultations with Government Ministries and other actors selected through a multi-sectoral and multi-stakeholder approach. Organizations, both included in this mapping and not, may be working on other actions that are important for improving nutrition outcomes, however data on these actions has not been captured in this mapping. Furthermore, this mapping is not assessing the quality or accuracy of the reported coverage. Rather it can be used as an indicator of where certain areas or actions should be analysed further.
- In addition, some challenges were encountered in the collection and analysis of data in Cambodia:
 - Improved availability and participation of government partners in meetings and training sessions could contribute significantly to the collaborative environment and drive positive outcomes;
 - Active participation from government partners in data collection responsibilities is encouraged, as their engagement is pivotal in ensuring comprehensive data accuracy and depth;
 - Data collection period took significantly longer than scheduled;
 - The mapping does not include information identified by government partners due to missing information;
 - Target group information appeared to be the most difficult source of information to capture in the interview questionnaires;
 - Teams experienced difficulty customising the DHIS2 software;
 - The project timeline was extended due to the busy schedules of esteemed partners and the significant 2023 RGC Election and government transition, allowing for additional time.
- The results of this exercise should thus only be interpreted as indicative and directional in the context of a first exercise. Future iterations will help to refine the approach and improve the quality of the results.







Key Messages

A total of 24 actions were implemented, and between all actions, all 25 provinces were reached.

These actions were implemented by 55 implementers, 34 catalysts, 39 donors and 15 ministries.

Ministry of Health (MoH) was the most active ministry, responsible for 16 actions, followed my Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries (MAFF) with 9 actions.

The least implemented actions were 'micronutrient supplementation for pregnant and lactating women' (0 implementers), 'conditional cash transfers dependent on engagement with health/nutrition services' (0 implementers), 'micronutrient supplementation for infants children' (2 implementers), and 'management of overweight/obesity' (2 implementers).

11 actions reached 25% of provinces of less.

4 actions - 'Breastfeeding education and counselling on optimal breastfeeding practices', 'promotion of hygiene practices, such as hand washing, latrine use, safe drinking water consumption, etc.', 'wash promotion', and 'provision of nutritious food aid during emergency/disasters' - had 100% coverage, reaching all 25 provinces.

The most reached target groups were households (13 actions), pregnant women (9 actions), and smallholder farmers (7 actions).

The most utilised delivery mechanisms were trainings (19 actions), VHSGs (15 actions), and meetings/workshops (12 actions).

A total of 42 implementation mechanisms were utilised.
