Dr Francesco Branca is the Director of the Department of Nutrition and Food safety in the World Health Organization, Geneva (since February 2020).

From 2008 to 2019, he was the Director of the Department of Nutrition for Health and Development. During this period, WHO has developed a WHO Nutrition strategy, established a new nutrition guideline development process and has developed a Comprehensive Implementation Plan on Maternal, Infant and Young Child Nutrition with six global targets. He has been leading the preparation of the 2nd International Conference on Nutrition and the Secretariat of the Decade of Action on Nutrition. Before that, in 2005-2008, Dr Branca was the Regional Advisor for Nutrition at the WHO Regional Office for Europe.

Between 1988 and 2005, he has been a Senior Scientist at the Italian Food and Nutrition research Institute where he was leading studies on the effects of food and nutrients on human health at the different stages of the life cycle and on the impact of public health nutrition programmes. He has been President of the Federation of the European Nutrition Societies in 2003-2007.

In 1985-1986, Dr Branca has been a medical staff of a Primary Health Care project in the South of Somalia ran by the Italian NGO, CISP. Dr Branca graduated in Medicine and Surgery and specialized in Diabetology and Metabolic Diseases at the Universita' Cattolica del Sacro Cuore, Roma and obtained a Msc and then a PhD in Nutrition at Aberdeen University.



Lynnda Kiess is currently the Chief of Learning and Innovation with the World Food Programme Nutrition and Food Quality Service based in Rome. Prior to joining WFP in 2010, Lynnda served as the Head of Health and Nutrition at Concern Worldwide based in Dublin for four years. From 1997-2004 Lynnda worked with Helen Keller International, first as the Country Director in Bangladesh, then as a Regional Advisor for Asia Pacific and finally as the Head of Health and Nutrition based in New York. She also worked for the World Bank Population, Health Nutrition Team and was a Child Survival Fellow at USAID.

With thirty plus years of experience in operational research, programme design and advocacy working in sub-Saharan Africa, South and East Asia, and the United States, her expertise ranges from nutrition analysis, food security, food policy and food systems, public health nutrition as well as humanitarian response in emergency and fragile contexts.

Lynnda has an MPH in International Health from Johns Hopkins University and a B.S. in Nutritional Science from Purdue University.



Leah Richardson, Senior Technical Associate at the Emergency Nutrition Network (ENN), leads ENN's deepening engagement in nutrition sensitive food systems transformation. She provides specialised technical support to donors and leads on developing ENNs strategic direction in nutrition within Food Systems. Leah also co-leads the large portfolio of work on improving the management of nutritionally at-risk infants under 6 months and their mothers (MAMI). She also provides technical support to existing project areas such as infant and young child feeding in emergencies (IYCFE) and emerging areas of work.

Leah has over 15 years of experience in public health nutrition focusing on improving humanitarian response for vulnerable groups such as women, children and the displaced. After her first Master in International Public Health from Tulane University, she gained experience from UNICEF, WFP, UNHCR, the Global Nutrition Cluster, and numerous NGOs in a wide range of African and Asian countries. Her first decade of experience impressed on her the intersectoral nature of the nutrition puzzle. She has authored a series of UNICEF programming guidance on integrating WASH and nutrition and spent a couple years establishing a strategic programmatic focus on WASH and health within WaterAid. This led to a second mid-career Masters in Sustainable Food Systems.



Dr. Lujain Alqodmani is the Chief Action Officer at EAT and a member of EAT's senior leadership team. Lujain is responsible for the implementation of EAT's strategic action agenda, oversees all EAT's projects and measures the overall organizational impact. Lujain has a background in global health and medicine. Prior to joining EAT, she worked in various positions, including serving as an emergency physician in Kuwait.

She is the President of the World Medical Association (WMA) for the term 2023-2024. She served as the co-chair of the WMA Environment Caucus and was the International Relations Director of the Kuwait Medical Association. Prior to this, she served as Membership Director at Women in Global Health, a Regional Coordinator of the Eastern Mediterranean Region of the International Federation of Medical Students' Associations (IFMSA) and IFMSA's Vice President for Internal Affairs. She was also a member of the Health Adaptation Committee of Environment Public Authority in preparation for Kuwait's Second National Determined Contributions Report to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) 2018. Lujain has participated in several UN conferences and World Health Assembly meetings. She has a medical degree from Kuwait University and a Master's degree in International Healthcare Management, Economics and Policy from SDA Bocconi. Lujain is a Syrian national.



Dr. Md. M. Islam Bulbul is Program Manager for Bangladesh National Nutrition Services and the Technical SUN (Scaling Up Nutrition) Focal Point. He works under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) in the Public Health, Global Health and Nutrition arena.

As a member of Bangladesh Civil Service (MoHFW), he has gained experiences in the Health Ministries related to Health, Nutrition & Population. He was extensively involved in the process of formulation (from development to endorsement) of Second National Plan of Action for Nutrition.



Karima Ahmed Al-Hada'a, is the Planning and Liaison Specialist in the SUN-Yemen Secretariat - Ministry of Planning & International Cooperation, YEMEN. She led the development process of Yemen's Multi-Sectoral Nutrition Action Plan, Yemen Action Plan on Wasting, Yemen Nutrition 4 Growth Commitments 2021, and National Food Systems Transformation Pathways. Karima has been working to bring together different stakeholders from the government, UN agencies, donors, international governmental organizations (INGOs), civil society organizations (CSOs), and business sectors to strengthen national nutrition platforms. This collaboration is aimed at improving the impact and sustainability of interventions through national systems and

Prior to that, since 2014, he has been Advisor in charge of the Health Sector to the 2nd Vice-Presidency of the Republic of Burundi and he also provided Technical Assistance to the Scaling Up Nutrition (SUN) Secretariat.
